AUTOMOTIVE NOTES

News from the Council

- Due to COVID-19 regulations, the AGM has delayed from April 4th, 2020 to October 24, 2020. Due to the delay council officer reports were circulated to all clubs.
- There has been a number of enquiries to the council relating to second and third hand report of incidents where people transporting vehicles on trailers have attracted the attention of the police. This appears to be result of Fair Trading regulation requiring transport of vehicle using a trailer fitted with a fixed or removable winch, or carrying a vehicle which cannot drive onto the trailer under its own power, to comply with Tow Truck Industry requirements. The issue is complex and CHMC has published the result of their investigations in the latest The Dinkum Oil. They request that should any club have first hand experience of difficulty relating to towing of a car trailer on public roads, it is requested to relate that experience to Councils RMS Liaison Officer, Peter Wright.
- The Committee is keen to reinforce the importance of the traditional CHMC Annual Rally and encourages clubs to consider hosting the 2021 Rally. Committee members are willing to assist any club which may have suitable facilities, but may need background assistance in hosting the Rally.
- The Pie Cart picked up a bit of damage in the hailstorm (some minor damage to the bonnet and fender). Repairs were covered by insurance. Questions were asked why the Pie Cart hadn't been moved to Googong and a direction given that it should be moved immediately
- The ANU Kambri Show and Shine was considered a great success and the council encourages clubs to look at it as a venue for future events.
- The CHMC will have been operating for 50 years in October 2020. Plans are to celebrate this milestone at Raymond Terrace Saturday 24th—Sunday 25th of April. This will include the postponed AGM.

SOME ANECDOTES OF MOTORING IN MELBOURNE IN THE EDWARDIAN ERA

Some of the earlier members of our club may recall a young lad joining the Veteran Car Club, as it was then, in the early 1970s. Achalen Holmes was a schoolboy at Canberra Grammar. His grandfather, Faris Palfreyman had sold his Queensland property, and moved to Orde St, Forrest. Prior to selling up in Queensland, he had an auction in which some dozen or so vintage Rolls-Royce cars were sold. At the home in Forrest, just off Melbourne Avenue, there were four Edwardian Silver Ghosts garaged, and Achalen arranged permission from his grandfather, for a viewing by club members.

Achalen has maintained his interest in Silver Ghosts, and I have kept in touch with him over the years. Recently I asked him if a Victorian car registered [Vic] 5740 in the name of A. Palfreyman, was a family car. He confirmed that it was, that this person was Achalen Palfreyman, after whom he was named, and that the car was a Metallurgique, of Belgian manufacture. Achalen Holmes then sent me the photo depicted below. It was fitted with superb Vanden Plas single-seater sporting coachwork, with rear mother-in-law seat.



Achalen then related some interesting anecdotes on the car. His grandmother used to attend Toorak College, and from the time she was about 13 years old, until the end of her school years, she drove this car from the family home in Garden St, South Yarra to her school nearby. After school, she often drove down Toorak Road, and into the city to George's Café in Collins Street, taking several friends with her, for a nice spread of afternoon tea. With the car being limited in seating capacity, it was necessary on occasions for some girls to ride on the running boards.

On departing from there, as she was petite and could not crank the car, she would roll-start the car down Collins Street, and if it had failed to start by then, the policeman on point duty at Swanston Street would be called upon to crank start the car. His grandmother told Achalen H., that as the paving of the streets was of wooden blocks back then, and saturated with horse urine, it often became very slippery, and that on one occasion she lost control and did a 360 around the policeman on point duty, without collecting him. She knew all the policemen, as quite often she needed a crank start.

Driving home from school she would also roll the car down a gentle slope at Toorak College, with the school gardener called upon if it failed to start.

Every summer or so, she took the car to a paint shop in Collins Street to have it repainted to match the colour of her favourite hair ribbons, usually an emerald green, which on the car, faded quickly in those years. It was later painted black.

Achalen relates also that AWP as he knew him, had an early electric car, which may have been a Detroit Electric, and that he understood that this car had a small electric interior lamp that lit when the door was opened. He also had another early car, with landaulette body, but the make is unknown.



Can anyone throw any light on the identity of this car? Achalen Palfreyman, its owner, is seen resting on the rear guard.

Motoring Adventures on a Happy Easter Long Weekend of Long Ago.

1906

We have looked at a couple of historic motoring events, and local cars of the Canberra, Queanbeyan, Yass and district, our immediate area, over time. But one very significant event that we have not taken the time to review, is the question of who was first to reach the summit of Mt Kosciusko in a motor car. Some early Australian magazine articles featured journeys to the top of Australia, as did some press reports, pre 1910. But who was first to achieve this goal, when, and in what make of car?

In an April 1906 copy of Evening News¹, Mr J. Pearson of the Cyclists' Touring Union responded to an earlier article that stated: 'Recently a trip was made to the summit of Mt Kosciusko by motor car; but it is not generally known that the ascent had been previously made on a bicycle.' Pearson continued: "Now I wish to make a correction. The trip to the top of Mt Kosciusko has never been made by motor car, nor is it possible at the present time to do so, and secondly a bicycle has been to the summit, but it had to be conveyed on horseback. The first cyclist to reach that eminence with his 'bike' was Mr Gainford, who undertook the journey about six years ago.

Some 25 miles from the summit, Gainford could not ride due to the conditions.' Pearson wanted to warn fellow cyclists not to contemplate such a ride at Easter, as it 'would be positively dangerous, as fogs and snow are plentiful about that time.'

(The cycling exploits of Joseph Pearson (1849-1939) are documented on the Australian Dictionary of Biography website.)

1907

In December 1907, it was possible to drive on the newly created Kosciusko Road, to within 4 miles of the summit. From there, it was only possible to walk to the summit². The NSW Government had invested a great deal of effort to open up tourist destinations, especially the Blue Mountains, and the Kosciusko alpine region was planned to be opened before 1909.

Construction of the Kosciusko Hotel had commenced in 1906, designed to cater to for an ever growing demand for high quality accommodation in the high country. It was opened in June 1909, in the midst of a snowstorm that heralded the late arrival of the winter.


The Government Architect, Mr Vernon, said the improved road from Jindabyne to the summit should be completed and hopefully would be ready for use by the end of February 1908³.


According to a January report in *The Daily Telegraph*⁴ the 'roads' of the alpine region had been improved and plans were under way for comfortable accommodation facilities. It was intended a more comfortable route to the summit would be achieved in the foreseeable future. In January 1908, Mr C.W. Oakes, M.P. reached Mt Kosciusko in 'a comparatively small powered' De Dion Bouton. His progress however, was halted 3 miles from the summit, and from there Oakes resorted to horseback to reach the summit and then continue on around the ridges to the Blue Lake. So the scene had been set for adventurous motorists with cars of appropriate capacity, to contemplate an assault on the mountain.

The mystery as to who would be first to conquer the mountain can now be answered, subject to an appeal of course, as more information may come to hand.

From *The Sydney Mail*⁵ we learn of the claim made by Mr E.F. Miller of Melbourne, which is very strong indeed. On both Monday 13 and Good Friday, 17 March, 1908, Miller drove his car from The Creel, at the Thredbo River, to the summit, a distance of 27 miles, with seven on board, in one hour and 45 minutes. His car was a 30 HP Leon Bollee supplied by Dalgety & Co, of Melbourne. We may presume that Miller's journey from Melbourne was by road, as there was no direct rail link to the region to make his life that bit easier.

Some four weeks later, Miller's car was a prime exhibit at Sydney's Royal Easter Show, on Dalgety's Stand, adjacent to their feature rural exhibit of cream separators and milking equipment.



'The Referee', of the same date⁶, a much respected and motoring- oriented Sydney paper of the period, applauded Miller's achievement, and said that the car attracted a great deal of attention. It also provided a very brief description, that enables us, in the mind's eye, to visualise this car in its enamelled green finish, with its magnificent brightly polished, Italian-'Regina' manufactured, brand. headlamps and other accessories. Note. however, that the car was not fitted with a hood, at least not while on display at the Dalgety exhibit stand.

On the face of things, the Leon Bollee's success in mid-March, eclipsed another attempt by only a matter of days, or did it?

From the Daily Telegraph of 1 April, we read the following:

SIR HARRY RAWSON'S TOUR.

Sir Harry Rawson and suite recently visited Kosciusko and district per motor-car. Two cars were employed, Mr. Herbert Garratt being at the wheel of an 18 horse-power Clement-Bayard, while the other car was a De Dion of 10 horse-power. The cars were shipped by train to Cooma, where the motor trip started. The stages were easy, owing to the many receptions given to the popular State Governor.

On the first day Berridale and Dalgety were visited, also Mr. Crisp's station, where some splendid shooting was find. Only 40 miles were covered. The second day was spent in visiting the surrounding districts. On the third day a start was made for Jindabyne, and thence on to Thredbo at the foot of Kosciusko. The fourth day out the cars climbed to the summit of Mount Kosciusko, where the party lunched.

Although a Melbourne motorist claims to be the first to reach the summit of Kosciusko, the road engineer of the district states that Mr. Garratt's Bayard really enjoys that honor. A culvert which had only been finished the day prior to the Governor's visit prevented any other car reaching the summit. There being practically no doubt as to Mr. Garratt's car being the first to reach the summit, it was christened "Kosciusko" by Sic Harry Rawson, and the car now hears a plate upon which is inscribed: "Kosciusko," christened by his Excellency Sir Harry Rawson, on Mount Kosciusko, March 20, 1908, being the first car to reach the summit."

The fourth day of the trip was spent in trout fishing on the Snowy, and the sixth being Sunday was spent in rest. On the seventh day the return journey was made to Cooma, and the trip completed to Sydney per train. The trip was a most pleasant one. The roads were dusty, and the surface on the whole not too good. The surface of the road up Kosciusko was soft, but quite safe, if taken with care, and can be mounted

by any reasonably powerful car.

Mr. Garratt states that a service of motor-cars will electly be running from Cooma right to the summit of Koschusko. It will shortly be possible to leave Sydney at 9.30 one night, and be at the top of Kosciusko the next afternoon. The trip is becoming a very popular one with motorists.



The Referee also backed the claim by Garrat, the chauffeur of the State Governor, on 8 April⁷.

But by then, the proverbial cat was well and truly out of the bag, and the hounds were running.


Sometimes, things aren't all plain sailing. Just when all looks well, something comes along to 'rain on the parade'.

Sir Harry Rawson (cf. Rawson's Pass and Rawson's Hut), pictured, was the State Governor of NSW, coming from a distinguished naval career. It was claimed that 'his' car, an 18 HP Clement-Bayard driven by Herbert Garratt, was the first to conquer Mount Kosciusko.

There followed a battle between the *Referee* and the *Daily Telegraph*, with both papers desperately trying to prove the integrity of their reporting.

The Australian Star⁸ also entered into the fray on the day immediately following the claim by Herbert Garratt's Clement-Bayard. E.F. Miller was clearly very annoyed and indignant that his claim had been refuted. It sounds like he was hot under the collar.

The Star paper of 2 April published the following:



Around this same time, another motorist, the wealthy Dame Eadith Walker had headed south with the intent of also driving to the Kosciusko summit.

Miss Eadith Walker and party have just returned from an ascent of Rosciusko in a 30-40 Itala car. Train was taken to Cooma, and the rest of the trip done per motor. The 26 miles from "The Creel" to the summit of the mountain were negotiated under very adverse conditions, the roads being in a frightfully sloppy state, while snow and sleet was in abundance. The rar successfully reached the summit, notwithstanding the bad conditions prevailing.

We see from the *Daily Telegraph*⁹ report (left) that Dame Eadith Walker's 30-40 HP Itala car reached the summit in April, 1908, when the weather had somewhat deteriorated with the approach of the winter season.

So whose car was it that was the first to the top of Mount Kosciusko?

Was it the Leon Bollee of the Vicorian motorist E.F. Miller? Or one of the NSW cars, the Itala of Dame Eadith Walke, or the Clement-Bayard of Herbert Garratt? Not a British car amongst them. Two cars of French manufacture, and one of Italian.

The writer is of the opinion that none of the owners of these cars set out to achieve fame in being the first to the summit. It was very likely that, for each, it was never to be anything more than a pleasure trip to take in the delights of the region, including rare alpine flowering species, and the refreshing mountain air.

So, let's say they all deserve our recognition for their exceptional achievements. After all there was only a matter of days between their historic ascents of Australia's mountain.

Whatever the outcome of the debate, we can be confident that these honeymooners of 1897 beat them all, in their hired 2 HP coach.

Did you know?

Australia is the only continent where driving to the summit of the tallest mountain could even be contemplated. By global standards, our tallest peak is tiny at 2,228 metres above sea level (approximately 1/4 the size of Mount Everest.

The mountain has a fascinating history, which includes being discovered twice due to a cartography error and is subject of a debate about whether it is actually Australia's highest mountain. Depending on how you want to count external territories, Mawson Peak in the Heard and Macdonald Islands, which has been Australian territory since 1947 is approximately 500 metres taller than Kosciusko.

You probably not going to get a car up Mawson Peak, but unfortunately, if you wanted to repeat the feats of those early Australian motorists, it's also no longer possible to drive up Mount Kosciuszko either. The road to the summit was closed in 1977 due to environmental concerns.
