## GENGE'S GARAGE— MORT STREET, BRADDON



A member sent through this great article featuring a little bit of local motoring history. Here is Genge's Garage on Mort Street Braddon. Established in the 1930s by Reginald Genge, Genge's Garage was a workshop, showroom and residence. Genge's Garage was the Austin agency for the region and also sold other brands including Rovers and motorcycles. Genge street in Braddon is named in Reginald Genge's honour. #### Did you know?

The Captain's Flat Railway closed to all traffic on 28 August, 1968. However, on the 10th of August, 1969 it was re-opened as the location for the railway scenes in the feature film, Ned Kelly (starring Mick Jagger). The special train scheduled for the film was hauled by Locomotive 1243 (renumbered 176 for the film, and fitted with a kerosene headlamp).

## AUTOMOTIVE NOTES

### News from the [Council](#)

- A letter to Dr. Hoskins of JACS to seek a meeting on the CRS changes/MOU has been submitted and the council is waiting on a response. Discussions are continuing on the increase in allowable compliance inspectors for the bigger clubs.
- The Council received nomination for the admission of the General Motors Club of Canberra as an affiliate. Stuart Willis of the club advised it had grown out of the Chev Bowtie Club. It was advised that all the conditions of affiliation had been met and proposed that the club be affiliated with the Council. The motion was seconded and carried.
- Marques in the Park is currently scheduled at John Knight Park in Belconnen on Sunday 17 November. There may not be a band or DJ depending on sponsorship but the event will go ahead.
- A system will be introduced where clubs will be required to bid for the two annual events sponsored by the Council, Wheels and Marques. The system will be developed and introduced in the 20/21 financial year.
- The Camp Quality Super Cruise is on 8 November. Details on the Council website.
- The Pie Cart is now registered in NSW and will be stored in Googong. Nick Arnott will continue to look after running maintenance. An informal discussion has taken place with the National Museum of Australia about custody and there was some interest. Further investigation will be undertaken with NMA and also CMAG.
- The AGM will take place on 17 October following the October general meeting.

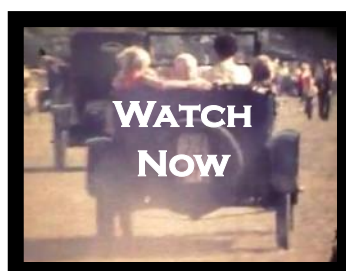

## 7TH HCCA INTERNATIONAL TOUR MOUNT PANORAMA, BATHURST

This rally was a bit of a family affair, as not only was I attending with my 1912 Roadster, but my parents brought their 1911 Tourer and my uncle and grandmother were in their 1915 Tourer.

### **Saturday 31<sup>st</sup> August – Distance Travelled approx. 130 kms**

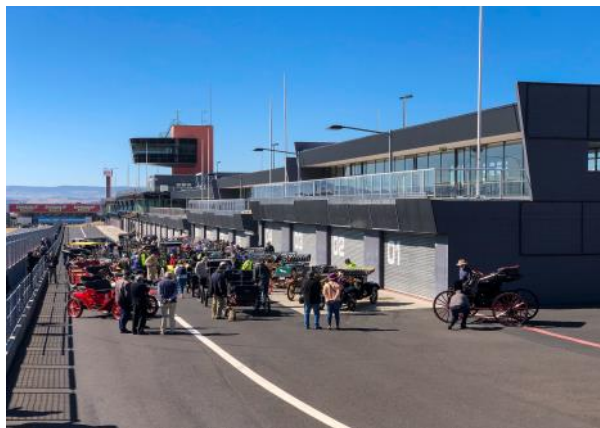
We congregated at the Pit Complex at Mt. Panorama with the other 62 entrants, (65 cars attended in total). Attendees included 25 overseas swaggies and a T Ford from the USA that has now travelled every continent. Initially more international cars were expected, but many had pulled out due to Australia's asbestos laws (you must be prepared to have your car dismantled for inspection if you bring it into the country). The owner of the well-travelled American T Ford said he paid a lot of money to ensure his car could enter Australia successfully.

Today's run was 40kms to Millthorpe Public School for morning tea and a visit to the Millthorpe Museum. As I was travelling solo, I put my hand up to take a passenger and was soon directed to a lovely lady from the USA who has travelled to Australia specifically for the tour with her son who owns a few later year Model T's of various styles. After some sight-seeing around town, we headed another 26kms to our lunch stop in Orange.

Instead of opting for the meals package, we went traditional, and had been warming up our quiches in the manifold cooker boxes. This made for a nice aroma while travelling the country roads while my lunch heated up. Being able to pull up to a stop and tuck into lunch within minutes was fantastic, and I think we might have made the others a little jealous. After lunch, a short walk around Orange city centre, and a coffee stop we headed back the 65 kms to Mt Panorama.

### **Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> September – Distance Travelled approximately 5 kms**

When arriving at Mt. Panorama this morning, we lined up along Pit Lane for a "class photo" from the pedestrian bridge at the end of the Pit Straight. After a repositioning a bit further up Pit Lane the cars went on public display and the ladies were invited to participate in a hat making seminar and workshop. With a free afternoon, we decided to head to a local winery near Orange (modern cars this time) that we had visited a few years ago.



Before leaving Mt Panorama though, we decided we'd take the opportunity to make a lap of the track without the rest of the tour line up. Heading off I was at the back of our group, with the 1915 and 1911 (in that order) running in front. Starting the climb up the mountain the 1915 disappeared, while I got stuck behind the much slower 1911. It is amazing the difference in ability between our cars. Halfway up the mountain the 1911 decided it was going no further, as the angle meant there was no fuel running to the engine (mind you a full tank might have helped). Thankfully when the track is open to the public, it's a 2-way road, so my parents and their 1911 could head back the other way. Unfortunately, I only made it another about 200 metres before I suffered the same fate and was following them back down. The 1915 did make it around, but only thanks to its hose that can be blown into while driving to pressurise the tank. Mind you, my uncle wasn't in a hurry to attempt a second lap.

## 7TH HCCA INTERNATIONAL TOUR MOUNT PANORAMA, BATHURST

### Monday 2nd Sept – Distance travelled approximately 130 kms

The roads around Bathurst were extremely trying on the old vehicles and with fewer and fewer cars making it to the start line each day. The roads were very hilly, with long slow ascents and steep descents, this put a lot of stress on the low gears, engines, and the brakes. Today was no exception with a 43 km drive to Tarana Hotel for morning tea, and another 25kms to our lunch stop at Oberon Heritage Railway



A few adjustments were needed to my recently changed bands to fix a slipping low gear so I could get over the hills on the way home again. With another 62 kms back and only a short distance from our accommodation, my T started to make some strange noises. Upon going to check the oil I found the bottom tap on the sump was open and oil had been blowing in the wind. Draining the last bit of oil uncovered some floating pieces of metal from what appears to be the bearings. Engine repairs now needed and out of the Maryborough T Ford Tour in a few weeks' time.

### Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> September – Distance travelled approximately 60 kms

Today out of the original 65, we only had 19 vehicles travelling to Abercrombie House, a beautiful old mansion built in the 1870s by Bathurst pioneers the Stewart family. Since 1969 it has been the home of the Morgan family who have spent the last 50 years restoring and maintaining this magnificent house, its outbuildings, and grounds and sharing it with the community.

After a lovely garden morning tea, it was back to the Mt. Panorama track for lunch at Walter McPhillamy Park at the top of the track on Skyline. We skipped the lunch stop as we didn't want to push the cars by trying to make it to the top.



## 7TH HCCA INTERNATIONAL TOUR MOUNT PANORAMA, BATHURST

### **Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> September – Distance travelled approximately 120 kms**

This morning we had a short drive to Chifley Dam for morning tea. After a walk along the dam wall and around the spillway it was another 59kms to our lunch stop at Mayfield Gardens. The gardens are Australia's largest privately-owned, cool climate garden and spans 16-hectares. They were fantastic and I'm told they are even better in the spring, definitely worth a return trip.

On the return drive into Bathurst, the 1911 was now struggling with a slipping clutch shortly followed by slipping brakes. The bands had been already adjusted as much as they could be and were really in need of replacement. Wanting to avoid any further damage, it was decided to retire it from the tour for the last 2 days and replace its bands in the coming weeks in preparation for the upcoming T Ford Tour. We were down to just the 1915 now.

### **Thursday 5<sup>th</sup> September – Distance travelled approximately 130kms**

I don't know if it was because the roads today were a little less hilly or the fact that repairs had been completed on a lot of the vehicles but more were back on the road again for a drive to morning tea put on by the locals in Blayney and a trip to Blayney High School for lunch and a bit of show and tell. The cars were parked on the oval and the students could come out in groups to have a look. The first group was the seniors, and with the school's permission they were taken on a few laps around the school oval. The kids had a great time but for some of the boys it did seem like the backup vehicle, a Torana with a trailer full of tools, captured their imagination a bit more than the veterans.

Unfortunately the school wouldn't permit the next groups of junior students to ride in the vehicles, which left many of them very disappointed and lost interest pretty quickly so we were soon on our way back to Bathurst. The departure from Blayney included a lap through the local retirement home where the residents had come out to watch the vehicles as they passed through.

### **Friday 6<sup>th</sup> September – Distance travelled approximately 20 kms.**

The last day of the tour was a short run of 20 kms to Perthville. Morning Tea was held at St Joseph's Convent, with a tour of the convent included. The students from the neighbouring primary school come down for a look at the cars. No rides today, but the owner/drivers opened up their cars for the kids to sit in and play with the horns and were happy to talk with the kids and tell them the history of their cars. It was great to see and the kids showed a lot of respect for the vehicles. This was pretty much the end of the tour, with the rest of the day for people to pack up their cars and get ready for the evenings presentation dinner held at the Rydges Resort.

## 2019 NATIONAL VETERAN VEHICLE RALLY BUNDABERG, QUEENSLAND

The National Veteran Vehicle Rally this year was based in Bargara. The rally followed the HCCA Bathurst Tour and John Handley organised a 5-day tour driving from Bathurst to Bargara for entrants who were doing both rallies.

The National Rally was a little different in that there were a number of pre and post rally events that entrants could attend.

The cars travelling from Bathurst arrived on the Friday to be welcomed by a happy hour that became a regular feature of the rally at 5.00pm each night

Sunday there were markets at Shalom College and an organised visit to George Punter's Model Engineering Workshop. George was a former High School teacher who retired in 2000 to work fulltime building scale models of petrol, diesel and steam engines, scale model trains, tractors and many more things. All George's models are fully operational. I will give a detailed presentation to the Club on his workshop. The Shelia Shack was open where entrants could have a cup of coffee and buy period costumes for men and women.

Monday Registration opened in the afternoon and a welcome dinner was held at the Bargara Cultural Centre. There was an interesting display of cars and motorcycles outside the Cultural Centre.

Tuesday was the 1<sup>st</sup> touring day heading south along the coast line. Our morning tea stop was at Barry Hoskins Agricultural and Motor collection. Barry has 2 very large buildings that house his collection. The cars and trucks were mainly from the 1950's to the 1980's there were many cars in the collection that rally entrants had owned over the years, there were many desirable cars like a Cortina 500GT a former Bathurst car. Following great morning tea and inspection of this collection we travelled on to the Elliott Heads Bowling Club for lunch. The afternoon run took us over the Hummock and Bundaberg for an optional visit to Bundaberg Rum and back to Bargara via Burnett Heads. Happy hour was sponsored by the Queensland Club who had arranged an exclusive release of Bundy Veteran Vemon beer, Bundy rum liqueur followed by sausages from the BBQ.

Wednesday was the long run to Childers travelling through a mixture of sugar cane crops, tomatoes and all types of vegetables. We also drove past the largest cucumber nursery in Australia. Childers is an Historic town with many of the buildings restored. The cars were on display at the historic complex and the Catholic School while we enjoyed a visit to the museum, a walk around the town, lunch at the pub followed by 3 short movies at the Paragon Theatre which is the oldest continually operational theatre in Queensland. We were served homemade ice cream before the movies. Happy hour was organised by the Victoria Club

Thursday was steam day at Burnett Heads and High Tea and fashion parade in Bargara. The steam day was held at Chris and Jenny Sorensen's home. Returning from Moore Park we were encouraged to visit the Burnett Heads Pub for a display and Pizza at the Pub while being entertained by a singer, a fun night before returning home in the dark.

Sunday evening, they showed the movie "Genevieve" in the Moncrieff Theatre in Bundaberg a great movie reminding us all of the joys, trials and tribulations of veteran motoring.

Monday, Edwardian Beach Breakfast Bonanza, bacon and egg breakfast this morning was provided by the Bargara Community and cooked by the Lions Club followed by talks on Turtles, Surf Life Saving and farming in the Bundaberg District. ## MOTORING AROUND CANBERRA

It was a big couple of months for automobile enthusiasts in Canberra. In case you missed them here were a few highlights.

**A Chequered Past**— Some fabulous cars from the National Museum's collection hit the track at Wakefield Park in Goulburn. For those that made it 12 of the Museum's 19 cars were on display motoring around the track including the 1918 Australian Six demonstration model, the 1923 5CV 'Type C' torpedo Citroen motor car, driven around Australia by Neville Westwood in 1925, the 1924-26 Aeroplane Jelly T-Model Ford truck and the 1948 Daimler DE 36hp landaulette used by Queen Elizabeth during her 1954 Royal Tour of Australia. **Queanbeyan Swap Meet, American Car Nationals & Big 3 Car Show** — A lot of member went out to the 2019 Queanbeyan Swap Meet on the 21-22nd of September. Those that made in on the Sunday would have also been treated to a couple of car shows (American Car Nationals and the Big 3 Car Show).

**German Auto Day**— While mainly a place for the more modern cars, this year the German Auto Day featured a real treasure. A replica of the 1886 Benz Patent-Motorwagen, which is widely regarded as the world's first production car. It was the first time it had been displayed in Canberra in about two decades. ### Did you know?

The first person to field-test the original Benz-Patent motor vehicle was Karl Benz's wife Bertha who also financed the development process. With her two teenage sons aboard, she drove a 194km round trip between Mannheim to Pforzheim.

Apparently the trip was rather eventful and involved a stop at the first petrol station in history (a Pharmacy where she filled up with ligroin, a solvent), a stop at a shoe maker to add some leather to the break blocks (thought to be the first use of brake linings) and Bertha using her hat pin to clean the carburettor and her garter to insulate some wire.
